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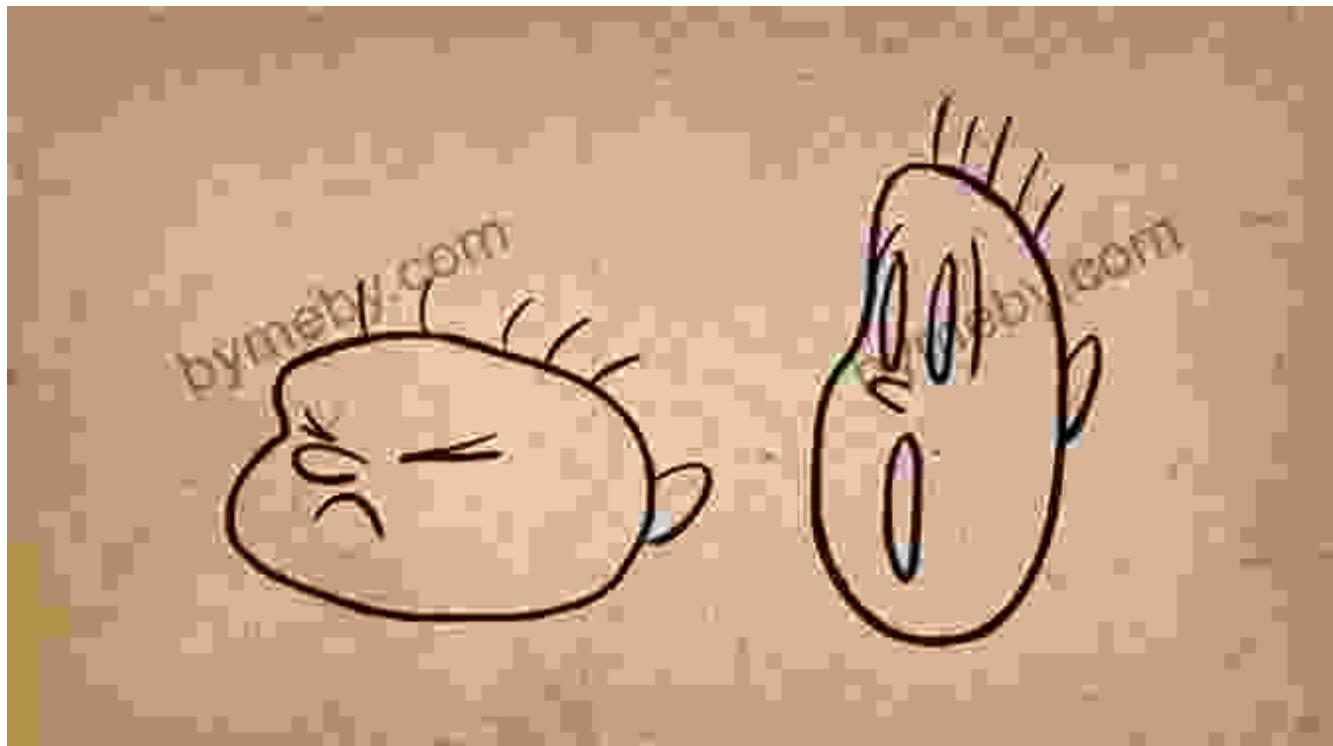

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The 12 Principles of Animation

1. Squash and Stretch

Squash and stretch involves exaggerating the deformation of objects during motion to create a sense of weight, elasticity, and fluidity. Imagine a

bouncing ball; as it hits the ground, it squashes, and as it rebounds, it stretches. This principle adds realism and visual appeal to animations.



2. Anticipation

Anticipation prepares the audience for an upcoming action. It involves showing a slight movement or build-up before the main action occurs. Anticipation creates suspense and emphasizes the impact of the following movement.

Anticipation

- Down before Up
- Back before Forward
- Up before Down
- Forward before Back

Every action needs some form of Anticipation

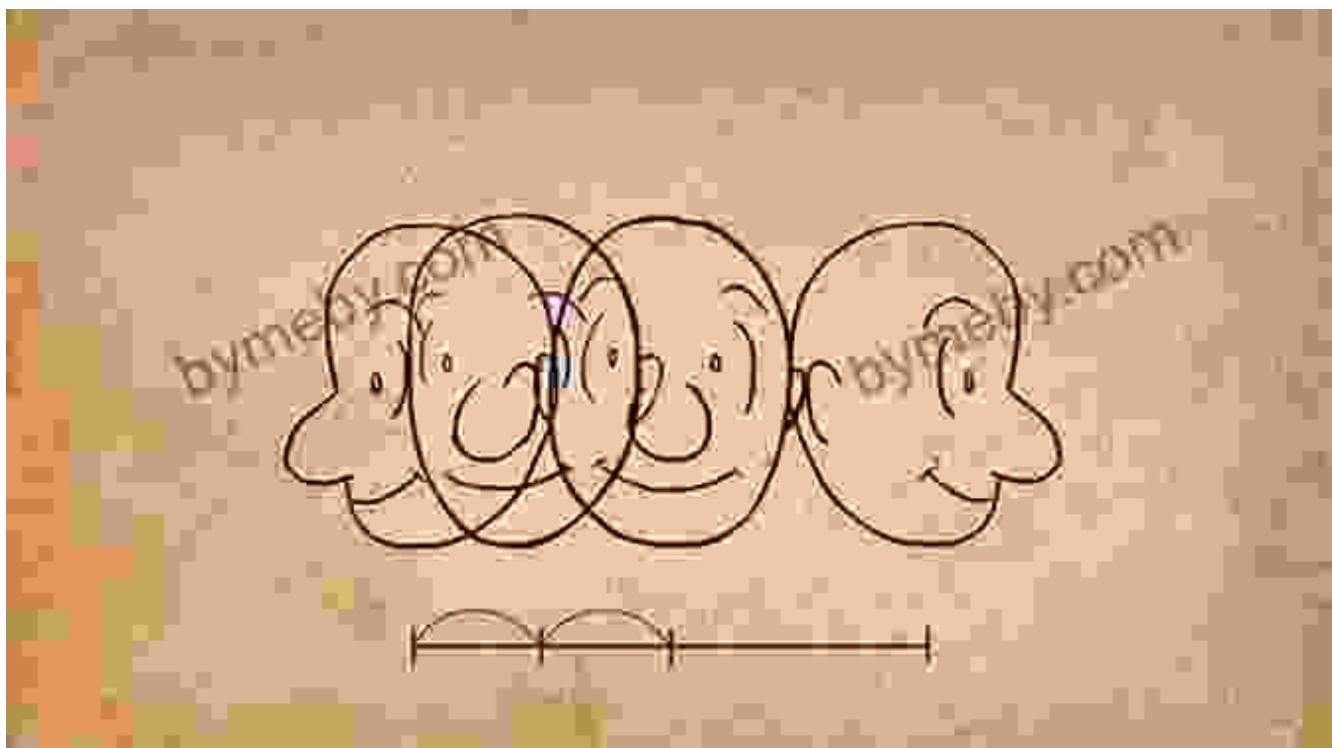


Always anticipate in the opposite direction of the action.

This movement prepares the audience for a major action the character is about to perform, such as, starting to run, jump or change expression.

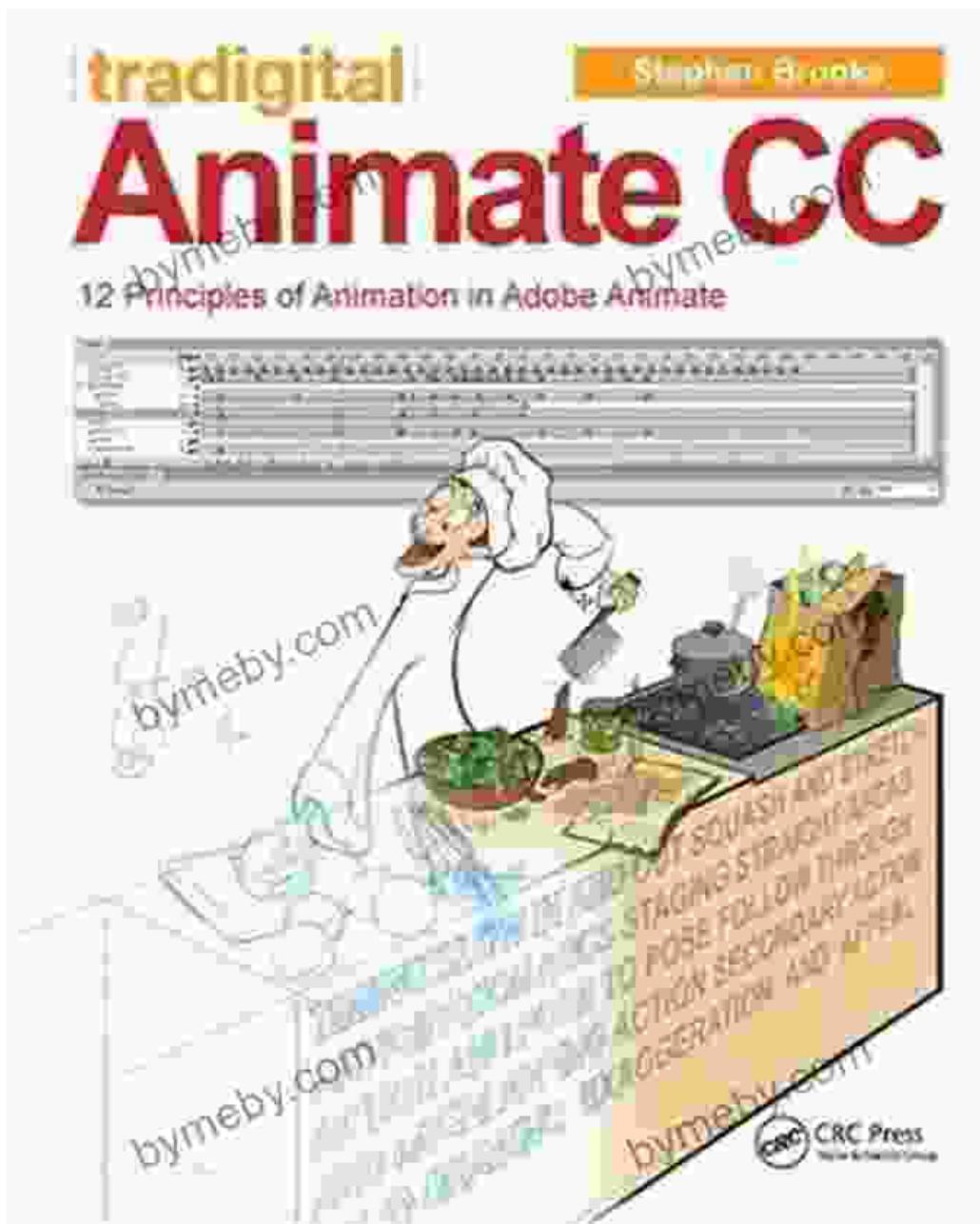
3. Slow In and Out

Objects don't start and stop moving abruptly in real life. They accelerate gradually (slow in) and decelerate gradually (slow out) when changing speed or direction. Incorporating slow in and out into animations adds realism and smoothness.



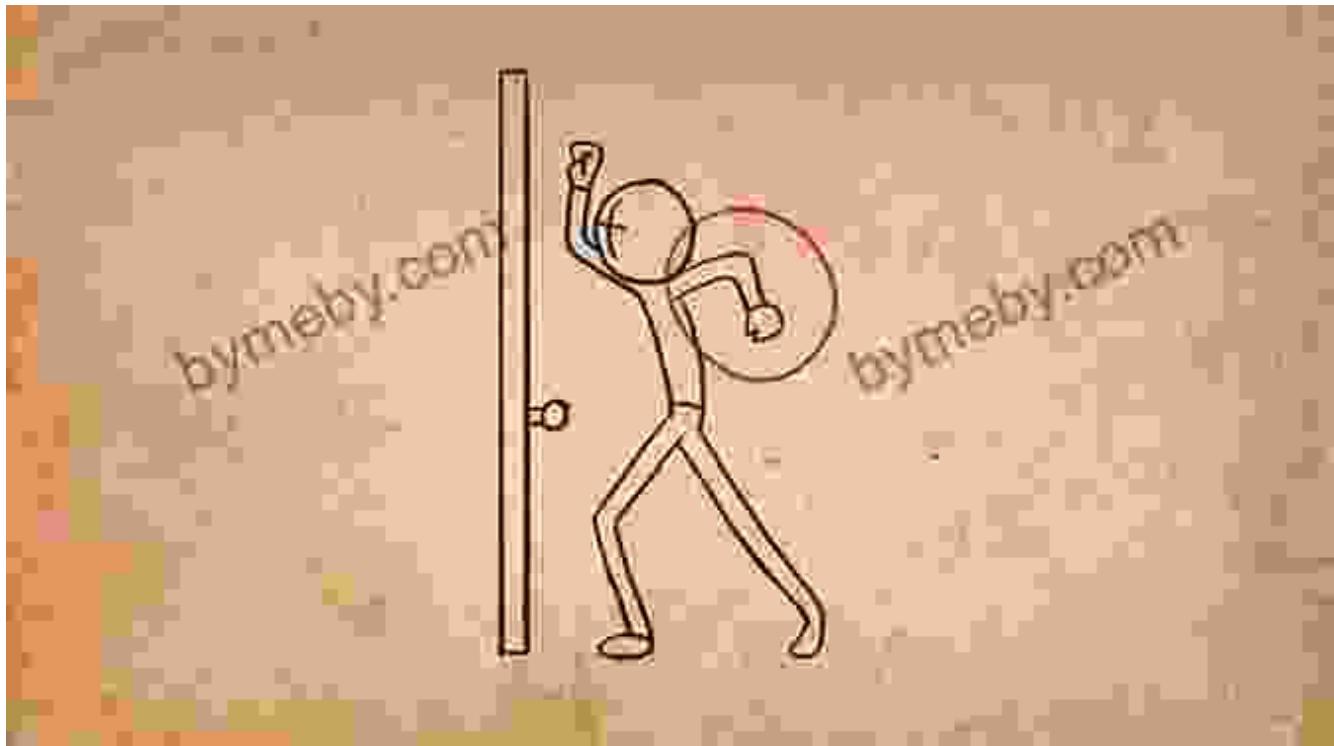
4. Arcs

Natural movements rarely follow straight lines. Most movements occur along curved paths or arcs. When animating, using arcs creates a more natural and fluid motion.



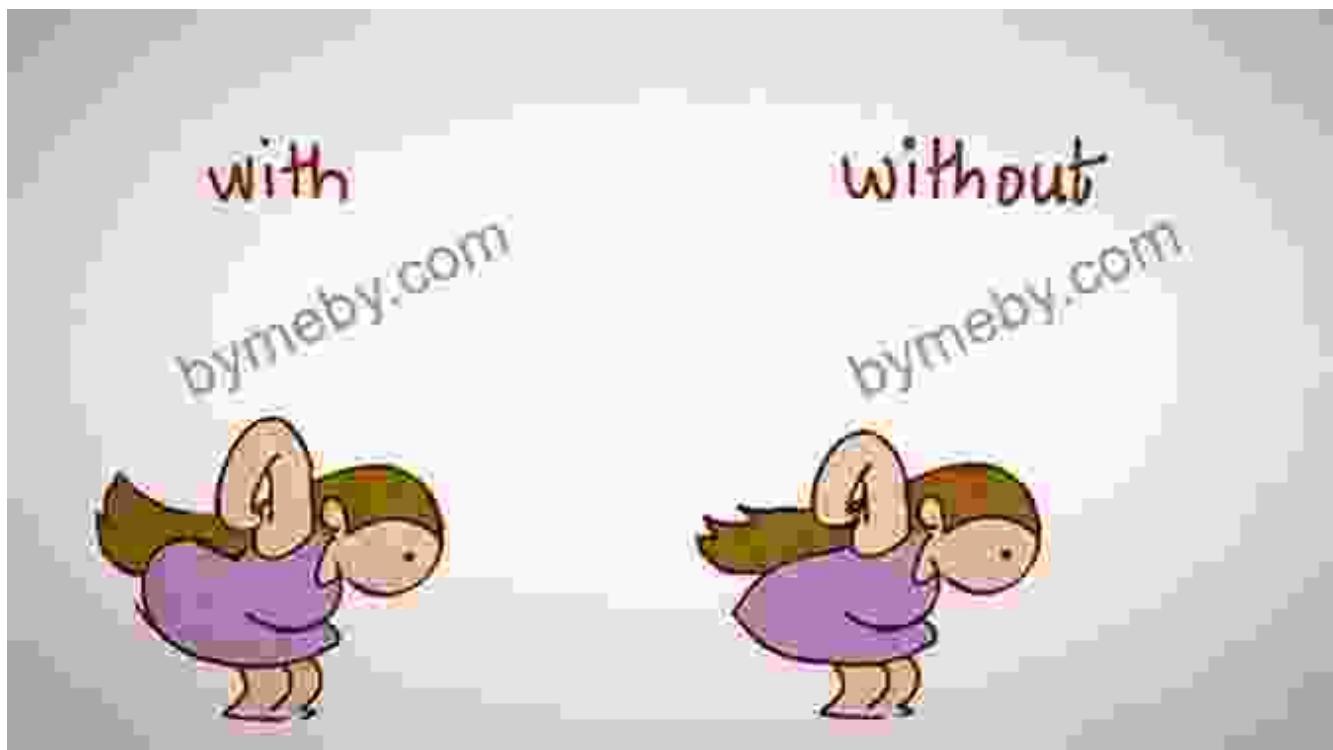
5. Secondary Action

Secondary actions enhance the believability and depth of animations. They are subtle movements that accompany the main action and add extra detail and realism. For example, when a character walks, their arms may swing or their hair may bounce slightly.



6. Follow Through and Overlapping Action

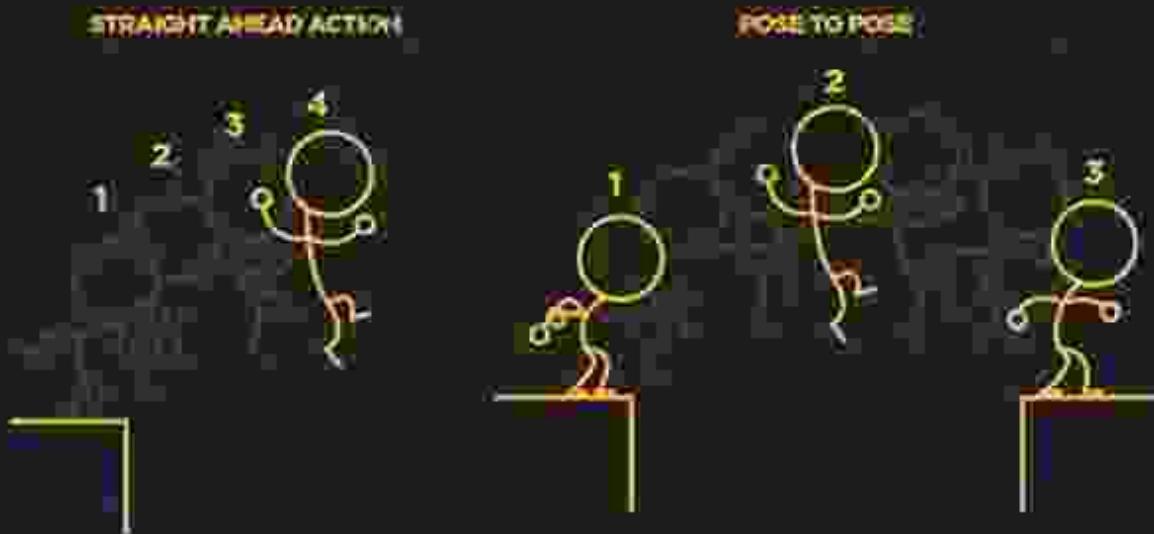
When an object stops moving, it doesn't come to an abrupt halt. Instead, parts of it continue to move for a moment longer. This is known as follow through. Overlapping action involves having different parts of an object move at different speeds, creating a sense of depth and complexity.



7. Straight Ahead and Pose to Pose

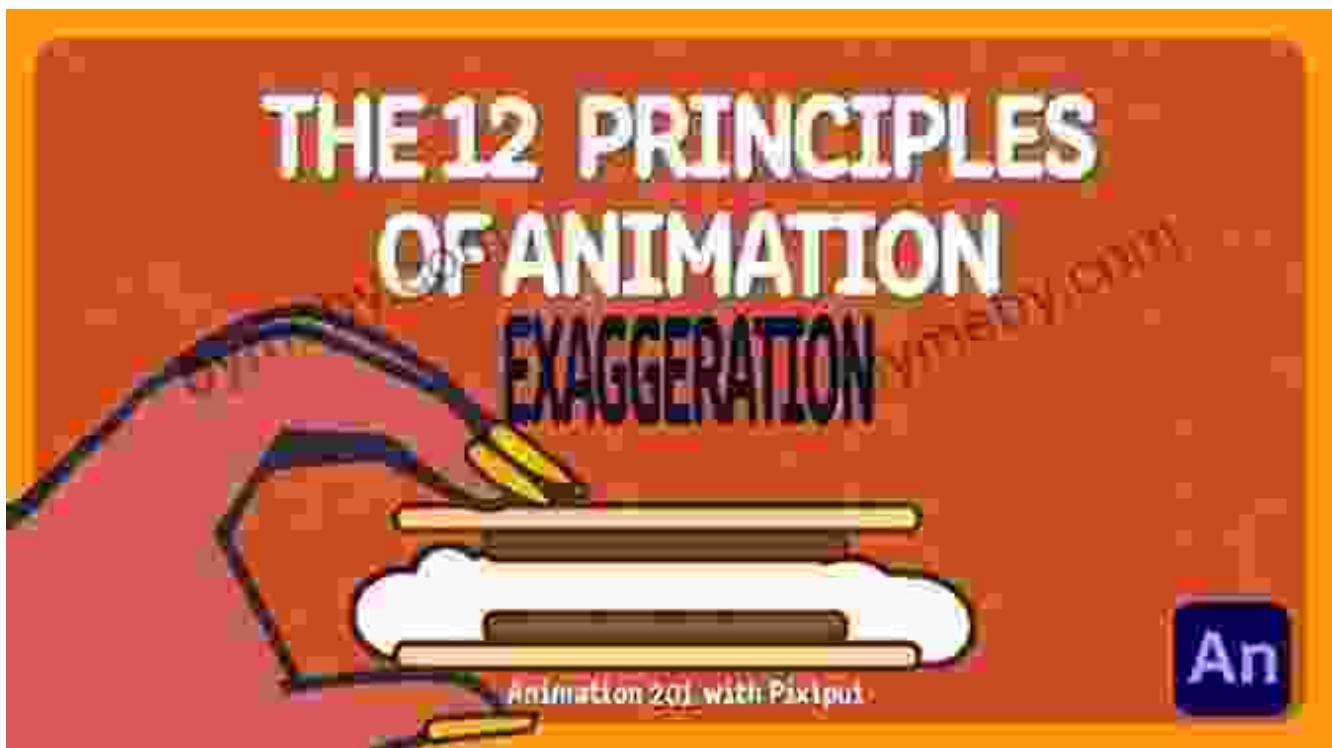
Straight ahead animation involves drawing each frame of the animation in sequence, from beginning to end. Pose to pose animation involves creating key poses or frames and then filling in the in-between frames.

STRAIGHT AHEAD ACTION AND POSE TO POSE



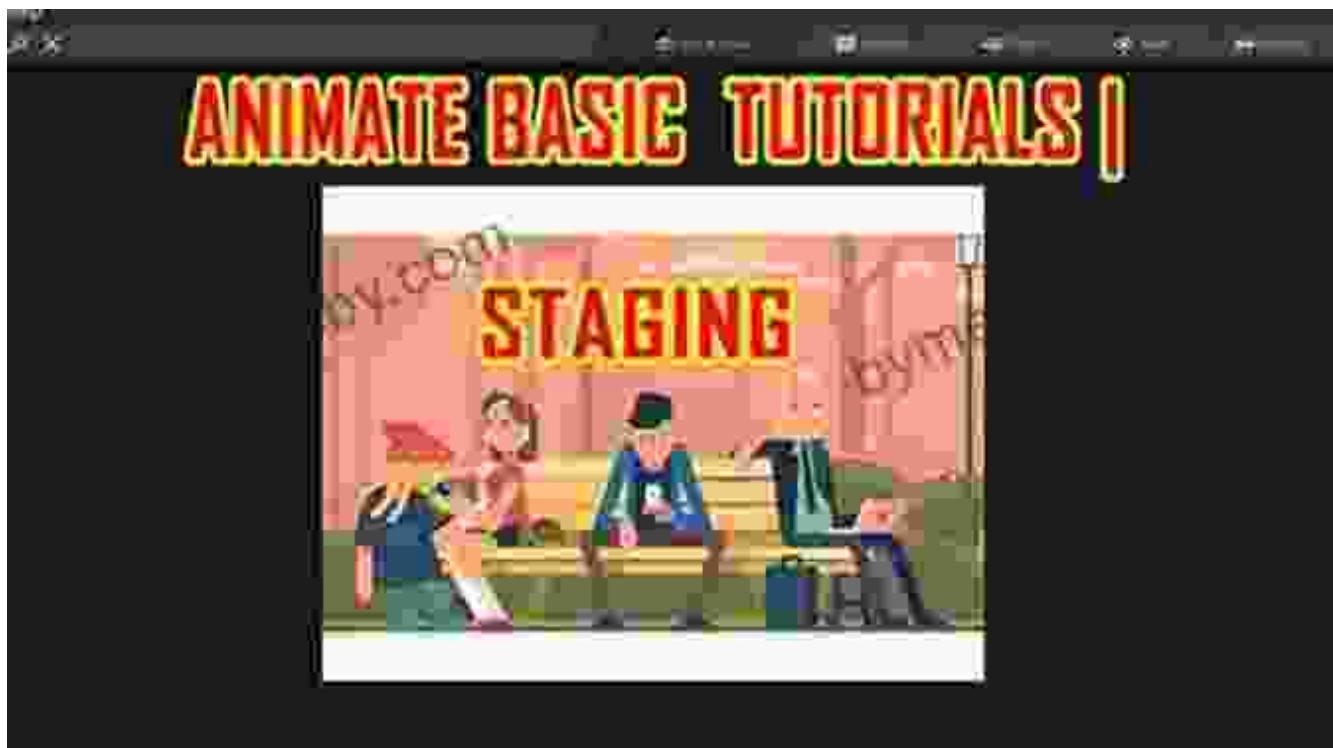
8. Exaggeration

Exaggeration amplifies the natural movements and expressions of characters or objects for comedic or dramatic effect. It helps convey emotions and ideas more clearly and memorably.



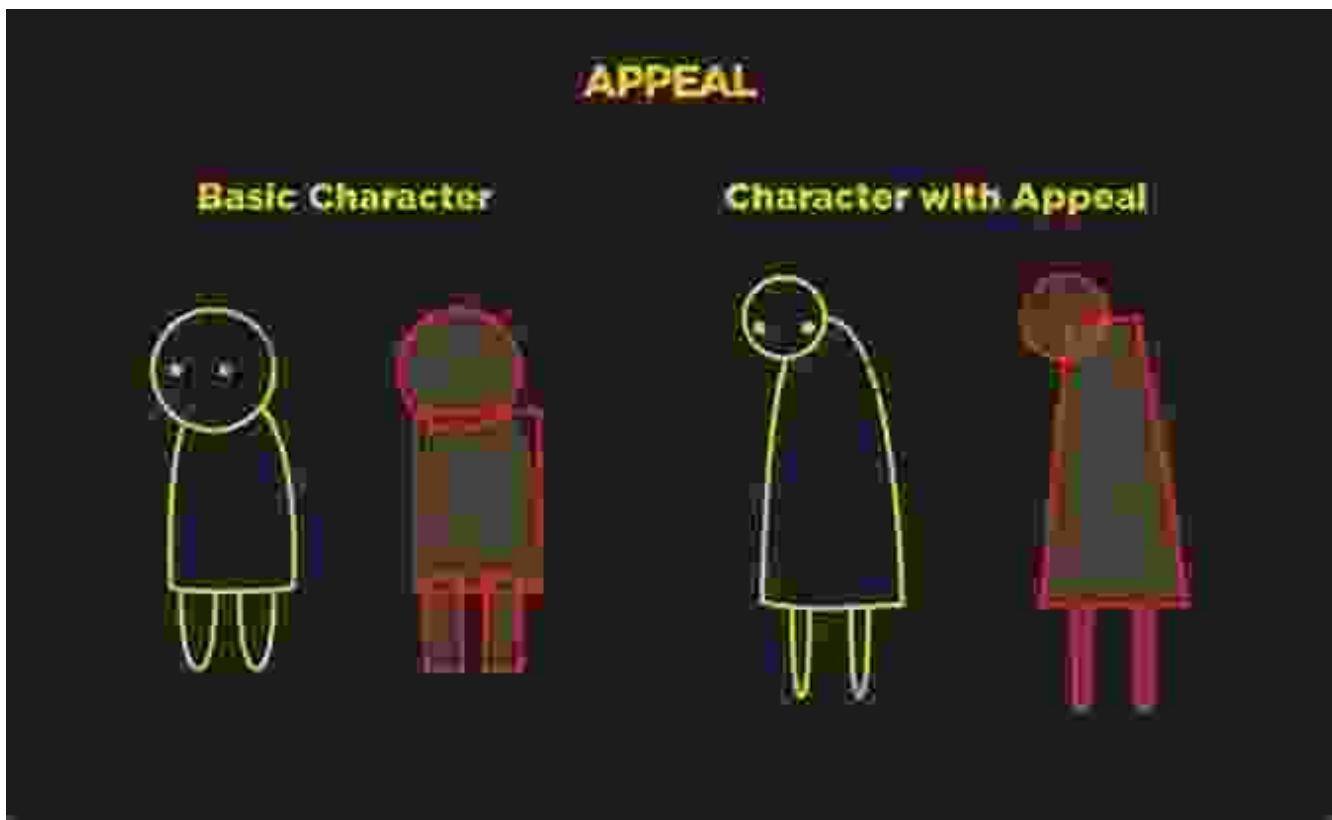
9. Staging

Staging involves arranging elements within a scene to guide the viewer's attention and focus. It determines what the audience sees and when they see it, ensuring clear communication and visual impact.



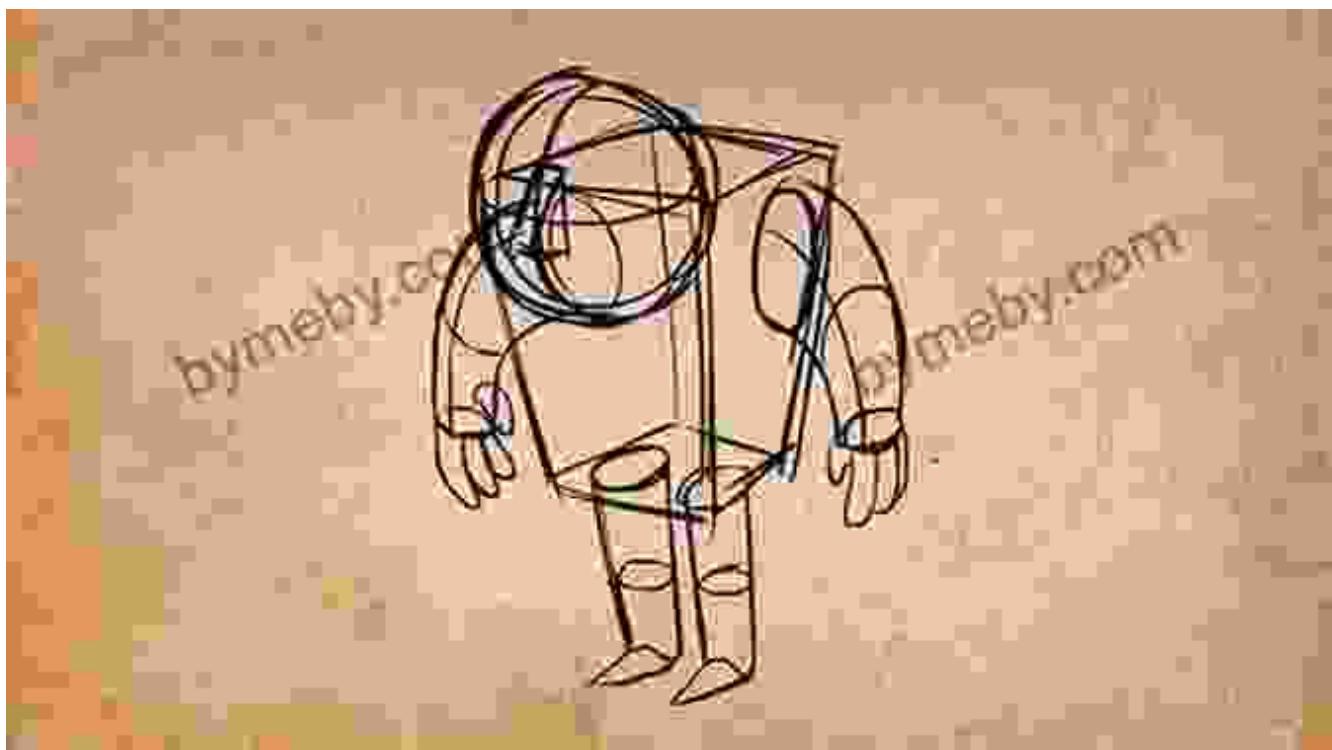
10. Appeal

Appeal refers to the overall visual appeal and attractiveness of an animated character or object. It encompasses not only physical appearance but also personality and emotions.



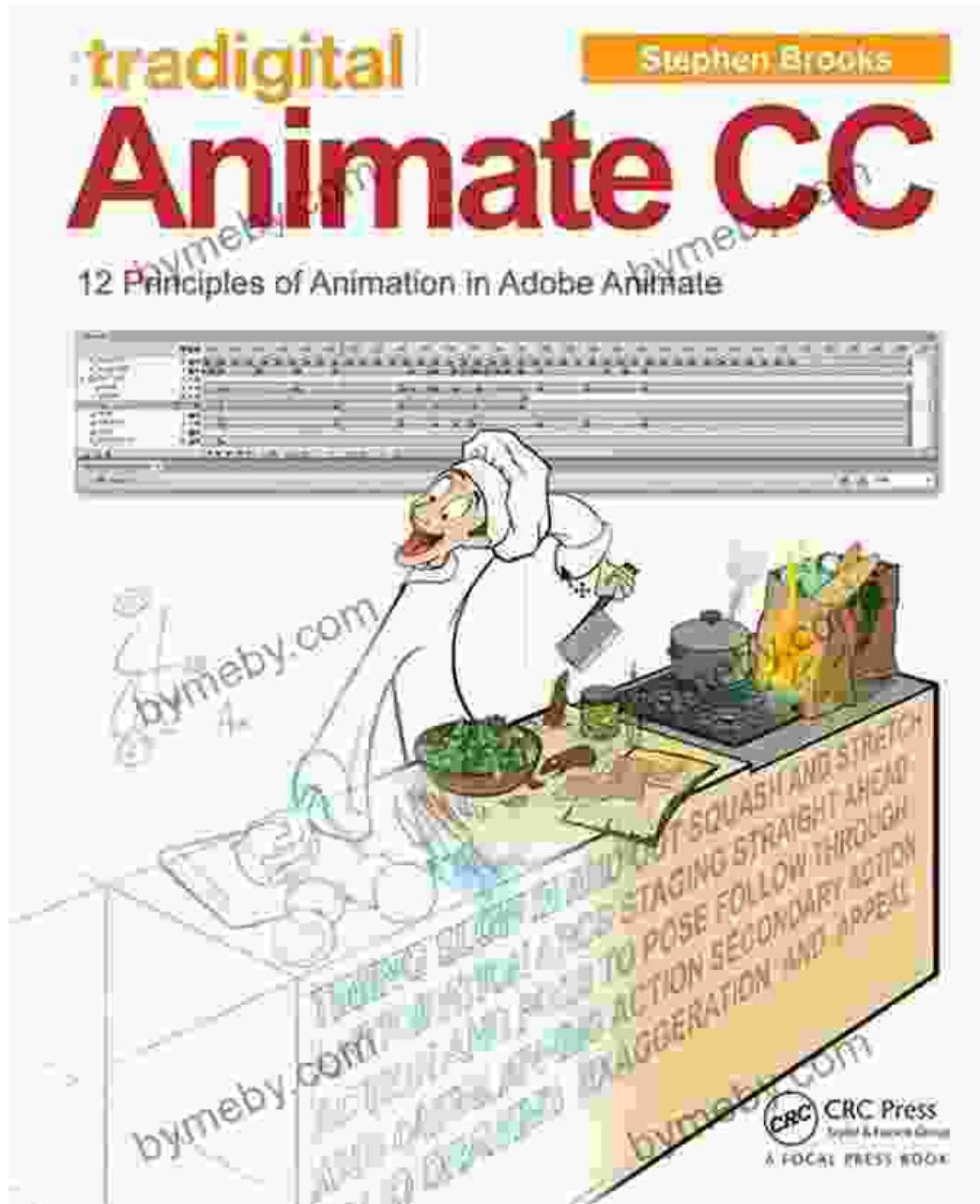
11. Solid Drawing
