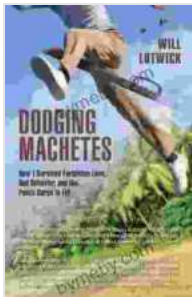


# How I Survived Forbidden Love, Bad Behavior, and the Peace Corps in Fiji
