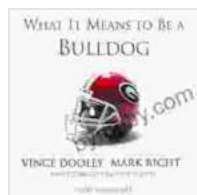


Vince Dooley, Mark Richt, and Georgia's Greatest Players: Gridiron Legends of the Red and Black

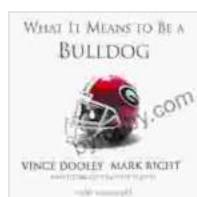
